
Annual Support

As our following grows, we will continue to find new and captivating ways to share our message of built heritage advocacy and conservation.

THE ARTS

Heritage Winnipeg was pleased to continue to work with talented local artist Robert Sweeney, showcasing his unique historic sketches, including a special commemorative print of the Kirkwood Block at 575 Portage Avenue, which was lost to fire in on February 2, 2022. Robert also made custom sketches for the winners of our Doors Open Winnipeg 11th Annual People's Choice Awards, celebrating the wonderful effort the volunteers put into celebrating our built heritage. Prints of Robert's work, including many familiar historic landmarks, are available for purchase on our website.

We were also thrilled to work with George Mitchell, an exceptional photographer, who published *Treasures* of *Winnipeg's Historic Exchange*, showcasing our city's national historic site in all its glory. Through our partnership we were able to do a book giveaway and offer copies for sale on our website at a 25% discount, with special signed copies being available for purchase by our members.

2022 Doors Open Winnipeg • May 28 & 29



THE MILLENNIUM CENTRE - 389 MAIN STREET

Heritage Winnipeg would like to thank the tenants and the entire team at WOW Hospitality Concepts, who did a fantastic job throughout their years at the Millennium Centre. As they departed the building at the end of 2021, they have been wonderfully helpful in supporting the transition to Heritage Winnipeg as building and event managers. This change made for a very busy new year for Heritage Winnipeg, administering another website, booking weddings, facilitating films and more, all to keep the Millennium Centre both vibrant and financially viable. After being closed for almost two years, the historic building is teaming with life once again, hosting both public and private events, while are first movie of the year, King of Killers was filmed in February and March of 2022.

We would like to again thank Parks Canada's Cost-Sharing Program for their generous grant enabling us to continue to restore the plaster in the main banking hall, repointing and other critical maintenance work. Continued maintenance and restoration are very important components in preserving this landmark heritage building. Also, we would like to thank the The Winnipeg Foundation for their critical COVID-19 funding that literally helped keep the doors open. In the next few years, we look forward to working on a plan for redeveloping the upper floors and after over four decades, finally bringing this heritage landmark back to full occupancy.

STREETCAR 356 REHABILITATION PROJECT

After work was paused for a year, we were able to resume some work on Streetcar 356 in the spring of 2021 with the wheels being put on. Unfortunately, December saw both the passing of Streetcar 356 Committee member Brian Darragh, one of Winnipeg's last streetcar drivers, and the sudden announcement of the closing of the Railway Museum, the home of Streetcar 356, at the end of 2021.

Since then, Heritage Winnipeg has been working with the Winnipeg Railway Museum Board to find a way for them to stay in their existing building while looking for funding to upgrade the space to meet current building codes. We are confident a solution will be found and work was able to resume on Streetcar 356 in June 2022. Thank you to all the volunteers, the Streetcar 356 Committee and to all our funders who continue to be committed to this project!

DIGITAL MUSEUMS CANADA - DISCOVERIT ARCHITECTURAL WEBSITE

Heritage Winnipeg would like to thank Digital Museums Canada for continuing to fund our bilingual DiscoverIt project during the 2021-2022 year. Heritage Winnipeg is working with Pattern Interactive to complete this website which is expected to be finished in early 2023.

UPPER FORT GARRY PROVINCIAL PARK

Heritage Winnipeg's Executive Director continues to be on the Friends of Upper Fort Garry's Board of Directors, which manages Upper Fort Garry Provincial Park. The Board continues to try and adapt post COVID-19, and looks forward to new programming and events soon.

CARNEGIE LIBRARY - 380 WILLIAM AVENUE

A 2021 City of Winnipeg Archives report recommended the Archives return to the historic Carnegie Library building as the most economical, environmentally sustainable and feasible option. On November 10, 2021, Heritage Winnipeg spoke in support of this plan at the City of Winnipeg Standing Policy Committee on Property and Development, Heritage and Downtown Development. The committee unanimously voted to support the \$12.7 million plan as part of the 2023 budget. We will continue advocating for the return of the Archives to this historic building until a resolution is reached.

CAPTAIN KENNEDY TEA HOUSE

Heritage Winnipeg has been working with the Kennedy House Renewal corporation to advocate for the conservation of this historic building. Although the house is outside the city, with no provincial built heritage advocacy organization, we have stepped up to help, offering our knowledge and experience. In a surprise announcement on December 17, 2021, the Province committed \$350,000 to support the first phase of the Kennedy House Restoration Project. We are excited to see work get started on this important project and will see it through to completion.

CITY OF WINNIPEG HERITAGE DESIGNATIONS

During the 2021-2022 year, our Executive Director appeared in delegations via Zoom many times at Community Committees, Standing Policy Committees, Executive Policy Committee and Council to advocate for heritage designations and against insensitive infill, all in an effort to protect Winnipeg's built heritage.

CRESCENTWOOD NEIGHBOURHOOD

The Heritage Conservation Districts bylaw was successfully passed in spring of 2019 and Armstrong's Point neighbourhood was the first area to received heritage conservation district status. Now we are working with the Crescentwood neighbourhood to support their efforts in becoming the second heritage conservation district in the city, which has become more significant after the loss of the Gordon House at 514 Wellington Crescent.

EAST EXCHANGE DISTRICT PROPOSED INFILL - 127 BANNATYNE AVENUE

The construction of a modern, 12 storey, 145 foot building was proposed for 127 Bannatyne Avenue in the East Exchange District. In addition to the proposed design being in stark contrast to its historic surroundings, this new building would exceed the City of Winnipeg's maximum allowable height in the area of 100 feet, setting a dangerous precedent that could result in more high rise development in the Exchange District. Heritage Winnipeg spoke in delegation in opposition of the variance, which was denied. Winnipeg firmly believes that with stakeholder consultation and a design that respects the historic context, this could be a successful building project that enhances the neighbourhood.

EXCHANGE DISTRICT PLAN 2022

Heritage Winnipeg was disappointed by the lack of opportunity to participate in the Exchange District Plan 2022, a 25 year plan that will inform the City's upcoming Downtown Secondary Plan. Although the plan was adopted by Winnipeg City Council in February 2022, Heritage Winnipeg feels it is still important to look into a possible heritage conservation district nomination for the Exchange District. The area is too unique to just be part of an overall Downtown Plan - it needs more transparent checks and balances. We look forward to ongoing discussions with all stakeholders to help ensure the area's conservation.













GORDON HOUSE - 514 WELLINGTON CRESCENT

Since the demolition of the house, Heritage Winnipeg has continued to work with the community to ensure future development of the site is respectful of the neighbourhood's historic character. On March 3, 2022, Heritage Winnipeg and residents of Crescentwood spoke at the Appeals Committee in opposition of a variance, critical to the redevelopment of the site. Originally denied by the City Centre Community Committee on January 11, 2022, the decision on the variance was being appealed by the property owner. Thankfully the appeal was denied again, pushing the developer to rethink their plans, including the design, for at least one year.

GREGG BUILDING - 52 ALBERT STREET

Heritage Winnipeg spoke in support of the Gregg Building owner, Knysh Construction, at a meeting of the Standing Policy Committee on Property and Development, Heritage and Downtown Development, asking for their vacant building inspection fee and empty building fee to be refunded. We believe the historic building should not be labeled as vacant while the owner is working diligently to redevelop the space. Our delegation, along with the owner, was well received by the Councillors and most of the fees paid are to be refunded by the City.

HUDSON'S BAY COMPANY BUILDING - 450 PORTAGE AVENUE

Heritage Winnipeg was very pleased to be included in the group working to find a new use for this historic building. After many years of being involved in various ways, we were so excited that on April 22, 2022, Earth Day, the downtown Hudson's Bay Company building was going to be gifted to the Southern Chiefs' Organization by the HBC. This Indigenous lead project will see the building redeveloped as a mixed-use space. It will be an important step forward in adaptively reusing this historic building and in reconciliation as a country.

JAMES AVENUE PUMPING STATION - 109 JAMES AVENUE

In 2020, Heritage Winnipeg held our 35th Annual Preservation Awards in the newly completed commercial space, home to ThinkShift, in the James Avenue Pumping Station. At the 36th Annual Preservation Awards in 2022, the project received recognition from Heritage Winnipeg for the painstaking rehabilitation of the original James Avenue Pumping Station building. The James Avenue Pumphouse restaurant opened in the fall of 2021 and the new mixed use additions are now underway. The additions are a compromise that helped make this important heritage building viable after many decades of being vacant.


J.C. FALLS HOUSE - 36 ROSLYN ROAD

After very careful discussions and consultations regarding the situation the new owner faced, and with a heavy heart, Heritage Winnipeg spoke in delegation to support the delisting of the J.C. Falls House. We always strive to find a solution that will conserve built heritage but are also willing to acknowledge there are rare occasions when the right choice is to let the past go so we can move forward. We were able to secure more stakeholder involvement and consultations on the materials, scale, and design of the forthcoming replacement building.















MUSEUMS AND HISTORIC PROPERTIES MANAGED BY NON-PROFITS

To date, there has been no report on the final recommendations regarding the management of City-owned and funded museums. We will continue to follow this issue.

ODD FELLOWS HOME - 4025 ROBLIN BOULEVARD

The Assiniboia Community Committee approved the zoning variance for a 199 residential unit building at 4025 Roblin Boulevard, adjacent to the Odds Fellows Home. The committee's Councillor Kevin Klein also recommended a motion that the Odd Fellows Home be nominated for a heritage designation by the Director of Property, Planning & Development. Heritage Winnipeg supports the proposed nomination and looks forward to the final recommendation, hoping the building's structure and integrity will be protected during the new development.

OLD ST. BONIFACE CITY HALL - 219 PROVENCHER BOULEVARD

The City of Winnipeg's announcement that both the Old St. Boniface City Hall and former St. Boniface Fire Hall (212 rue Dumoulin) would be sold to Manitoba Possible for \$10,000 caused outcry in Manitoba's francophone organizations. After an 11-hour hearing with the Standing Policy Committee on Property and Development, Heritage and Downtown Development on March 15, 2021, it was decided that the Old St. Boniface City Hall will be sold to the Société de la francophonie manitobaine. Heritage Winnipeg was in support of protecting this historic building for community use.

RELIABLE SERVICE STATION - 98 ALBERT STREET

After the demolition of the Reliable Service Station and the proposal of a new, ultra-modern building in its place, as of March 2022 no construction has begun. It is disappointing to see a vibrant heritage building be destroyed, only to be replaced with a vacant lot. Heritage Winnipeg will continue to monitor the situation and lobby the City to reconsider the ultra-modern replacement building design, which is in complete contrast to the historic streetscape.

RUBIN BLOCK - 270 MORLEY AVENUE

Heritage Winnipeg, along with South Osborne Village residents, have been advocating for the Rubin Block since it was vacated in 2014. The vacant building has the potential to serve its community as much needed affordable housing and retail space. The recent loss of buildings on Main Street to fire has sparked concern that the Rubin Block could face the same fate. We were pleased to help bring this issue to light and will continue to advocate for it to be fully occupied once again, as a vibrant part of the neighbourhood.

ST. BONIFACE BUILT HERITAGE - 227 & 233 PROVENCHER BOULEVARD

On January 17, 2022, the Standing Policy Committee on Property and Development, Heritage and Downtown Development heard our Executive Director, along with many other delegates, speak in support of designating two heritage buildings in St. Boniface. The City owned building at 233 Provencher Boulevard (Health Unit building) was designated through a unanimous vote. On February 24, 2022, City Council approved privately owned 227 Provencher Boulevard (St. Boniface Police Station building) being added to the List of Historical Resources. It is a wonderful sign of the growing appreciation and support for Winnipeg's modernist heritage.
